On March 11, Commissioner Kafoury convened a Bed Bug Summit with the co-sponsorship of the Multnomah County Health Department, City Commissioner Nick Fish and the Housing Authority of Portland. Experts from housing, government, pest control, schools and childcare, shelters, transitional housing, lodging and other public spaces came together to build an understanding of the scope of the bed bug problem in our community, identify barriers or challenges in dealing with the problem, and, came out of the day with a plan for moving forward polices that can keep bed bugs under control. This briefing will provide context and follow up information about the Bed Bug Summit, and information about the environmental health program offer (Program #40037A).

Bed bugs can be found in Multnomah County and throughout Oregon. They are in our public spaces and in our homes— and while bed bugs are not known to transmit diseases, they are an expensive nuisance and can cause stress and discomfort.

Agencies, businesses and non-profits have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to stop these bed bugs, including our own departments—money that could be spent in countless other ways to improve our community. Last year, a group of housing and social service advocates urged the county and city to provide leadership on the Portland area’s growing bed bug infestation problem.
